The Workshop focuses on the ethnographic study of global economies and markets, their coming into being and their consequences. Koray Çalışkan's work on global cotton will be compared to case studies of very different "global commodities": among them Matsutake gourmet mushrooms (Anna Tsing), scrap metal (Elizabeth Saleh), more cotton (Nikolas Schall), Bitcoins (Koray Çalışkan) and human sperm and egg cells (Michi Knecht). We will discuss the academic and political relevance of new empirical research that shows the dynamic processes of price realization, the contributions of scientific propositions in the making of markets, the daily interventions and negotiations as well as the importance of seeing markets as a continuous relationship of power. We will also work on methodological, epistemological and conceptual questions of "global ethnographies" and the development of "global ethnography research designs" that blend rigorous ethnography with rich theoretical analysis.

Speakers:

Koray Çalışkan is a political scientist, economic anthropologist and public intellectual at Boğaziçi University, Istanbul. His publications have contributed to the making of a new field of study in exchange, processes of marketization and production relations, combining theoretical, methodological and heuristic tools from the SSF (Social Studies of Finance), STS (Social Studies of Science and Technology), and Economic Anthropology. Carrying out research on three continents (Europe, North-America and Africa), following cotton's production and exchange for his book "Market Threads" (2010), Çalışkan looked at how farmers and traders make a global commodity. His book also presents a replicable theoretical research design that goes beyond studying cotton. In collaboration with Michel Callon for two articles about "Economization / Marketization", he proposed a new research program on processes of market formation and suggested new forms of understanding markets and economies. Importantly, these articles also show the role and performativity of modern sciences in the making of modern relations of economization.

Elizabeth Saleh is a research associate at the Asfari Institute for Civil Society and Citizenship at the American University of Beirut. She works in the fields of political and economic anthropology and has a special focus on labour, gender, resistance and social transformation. She obtained her PhD in Social Anthropology from Goldsmiths, University of London. Her doctoral research examined the entrepreneurial strategies of members of the wine industry as they converged in the Kefraya region of the West Bekaa. In 2015 Elizabeth commenced a new ethnographic study examining the reconfiguration of Syrian labour at the interface between Beirut's formal and informal economies. Most of her fieldwork takes place at a scrapyard in a working class neighborhood in Beirut, where she explores the effects of the Syrian conflict and the policies of the Lebanese state toward migration, labour and waste management in relation to the prosperity of the scrap metal industry. Elizabeth has held posts at the Orient Institute in Beirut, the London School of Economics LSE, Goldsmiths in London as well as at the ZMO in Berlin. She received an MA in Anthropology and Cultural Politics at Goldsmiths in 2004 and obtained a Postgraduate Certificate in the Management of Education and Learning from the same university in 2014.

Nikolas Schall is a doctoral student at IRTG Diversity / Mediating Difference in Transcultural Spaces at the University of Trier. He studied European Ethnology at Humboldt University, Berlin, and wrote his master's thesis on cotton as a global assemblage. His new research project "Cosmopolitan Solidarity in Transnational Activist Networks: An Ethnography of the Production of Global Relations" explores the question of how collaborations or alliances in transnational social movements are produced. More specifically it asks how solidarity becomes possible despite historically constructed particular identities and different positions in the social space.
